# Paul Helliwell rites tomorrow

Services for Paul Helliwell, 62, a Miami lawyer instrumental in the purchase of the Disney World site in Central Florida, will be at 10 a.m. tomorrow in Lithgow Coral Way Funeral Home.

Mr. Helliwell died Friday from a collapsed lung. He suffered from emphysema, and lost consciousness in his Coral Gables home, police said. Rescuers' efforts were in

vain.

Mr. Helliwell was a graduate of the University of Florida law school and had numerous business connections. He was board chairman of banks in Perrine and Cutler Ridge, and was active in the insurance industry.

Ten years ago, Mr. Helliwell acquired much of the real estate southwest of Orlando where Walt Disney wanted to build an amusement park. Disney interests refrained from making the purchases openly for fear that disclosure would boost prices.

Mr. Helliwell was the United States counsel for the Castle Bank and Trust Company Ltd. of the Bahamas, a bank being investigated by a federal grand jury involving alleged tax havens for American corporations and individuals.

He is survived by his wife, Mar-

jorie, and a daughter, Anne.

The New York Times News Service CALABOZO, Venezuela — Ravenous field rats are consuming as much of this year's Venezuelan rice crop as will reach the table of consumers, according to farmers here.

The assault by the hordes of rats in the rice fields below the Guarico Reservoir, which normally produce half of Venezuela's supply, have been called a national calamity. The rats eat their weight in rice each day.

Big red combines are now moving through the yellowing rice fields in the second harvest of the year. The rats scurry and leap to avoid the spiked reaper wheel. Those that are hit are seized by hawks and vultures that follow the combines.

The farmers expect to lose 40 per cent of the crop to the rats, forcing Venezuela to import rice. Until 1974, Venezuela was
