#### REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of the Town of Clarendon:

The school board met at North Clarendon July 3 and organized with Frank Teer as chairman and D. W. White as clerk. It was voted to have 34 weeks of school. Later each director was appointed as truant officer.

In June George Leonard was appointed as an uncertified town superintendent, and Mrs. Walter Hayes as the helping teacher. On June 10, 1923, Mr. Leonard resigned as superintendent. Later Mrs. D. W. White was appointed to serve the rest of Mr. Leonard's term.

It was thought best in May to take advantage of the \$300.00 which could be received from the state. As it is now, no aid from the state for repairs can be received.

With the amount received from the state, together with the amount received from the Parent-Teacher Association from North Clarendon, East Clarendon and East St., we were able to paint the school houses at North Clarendon, East Clarendon, East St., Chippenhook, and the Springs. The Springs school has been made by the state board as a standard school.

The Chippenhook Parent-Teacher Association has funds enough, with the \$150.00 I have secured from the state to standardize their school, and will not ask the town for a penny, nor their director, as was the case at the Springs.

At this time I wish to thank the Parent-Teacher Association of East St., East Clarendon and North Clarendon, who helped us with funds. It seems some of the parents do not cooperate with the school board. Until this is remedied no teacher can do good work.

And also the same applies to some members of the Parent-Teacher Association of the Springs. I think our deputy Sheldon of Fair Haven tries to overdo things, and is far from being able to fill Miss Rose Lucia's place, who had spent nearly the whole of her life time in rural schools.

There is too much red tape in this school law.

A tax of \$1.00 is recommended this coming year. There will have to be new steps at the Spafford school, and some sort of a heater. At the present time they are using parts of two stoves. We must also have more books as we have used old books so far, that our past superintendents would not allow us to use. Our schools have increased in size all over the town.

Let me say this, we have lived within our limit this year in spite of our repairs.

#### HELPING TEACHER'S REPORT

#### Fellow Citizens:

Owing to my brief survey of the schools in our town, I do not feel competent to give a very complete account of affairs. However, I do think our schools have secured and maintained a higher grade of work this year than they have ever had since I have known anything about the Clarendon schools. The increased interest of both teachers and pupils is very noticeable.

Also, there is a great deal of satisfaction secured from comparing the co-operative work of the Parent-Teacher Associations in this town with that of other towns.

There are many sections in our state that scarcely know what the term "Parent-Teacher Association" means. The people in those sections look upon the improvement of their schools through this method as a rare, and almost impossible achievement. These sections are by no means scarce. Our local associations should not be discouraged, but push forward the good work.

Noteworthy improvements have been made in installing proper lighting systems in the North Clarendon, Chippenhook and Clarendon Flats schools, and a new heating system at Chippenhook.

The class-room work of the teachers could easily be made more profitable by the purchase of a few new books. An exchange of books has lessened this expense this year, but the increase in the number of pupils in nearly every school in town makes the purchase of a few more books an absolute necessity.

Certainly no teacher can be expected to do justice to her work without sufficient books.

Yours for a successful year's work for the benefit of the future citizens of our town.
