MINUTES OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING MARCH 2, 1965

The annual meeting of the legal voters of the Town of Clarendon, held at Clarendon Town Hall at 10 o'clock A. M. on the above date was called to order by the Moderator, Amherst Weeks.

The Warning was read and business transacted as follows:

1. Moderator elected—Amherst Weeks.

2. Reports of Town Officers accepted.

- 3. Road Commissioner—Moved, seconded and carried that one Road Commissioner be elected by the voters.
- 4. Town Officers elected:
 - 1. Town Clerk-Mary Pratt for one year.
 - 2. Treasurer-Mary Pratt for one year.
 - Selectman—Nominated Earl Turner and Harold Johnson. By Ballot Earl Turner 77; Harold Johnson 29. 106 votes cast—necessary for choice 54.

Earl Turner elected for Selectman for term of three years.

- 4. Road Commissioner-Carl Lanfear for one year.
- 5. Overseer—Nominated George Holden, Charles Ketcham and Ralph Bristol. By ballot—George Holden 74, Charles Ketchan 17, Ralph Bristol 8. George Holden elected Overseer for one year.
- 6. Lister—Joseph Raiche for three years.
- 7. Auditor-Robert Huntley for three years.
- 8. Constable-George Holden for one year.
- 9. School Director—Nominated Irene Hill and H. Burdette Pratt. By Ballot Irene Hill 71, H. Burdette Pratt 35. Irene Hill elected for three years.
- 10. Grand Juror-Aldace Newton.
- 11. Town Lawyer and Agent—Aldace Newton. Amendment to Constitution—About Schools— By ballot Yes 75, No 15.
- 5. Motion made, seconded and carried that \$100.00 be voted for resurfacing.

- Motion made, seconded and carried that 25 cents on the 6. Grand List be used for Town Highways.
- 7. Motion made, seconded and carried that \$5,000.00 be voted for Retreatment.
- Voted to pay the minimum tuition set by the State for High School Students. Minimum tuition set by State for year \$475.00.
- 9. Voted to pay taxes to the Treasurer.
- 10. Voted to authorize Selectmen to borrow money for expense of Town.
- 11. Voted against having State Auditors.
- 12. Malt and vinous beverages to be sold in Town By ballot-Yes 78, No 14.
- 13. Spirituous Liquors sold in Town. By ballot-Yes 69, No 22.
- 14. Motion made, seconded and carries that \$100.00 be given to the Rutland County Humane Society.
- 15. Motion made and seconded that the Town pay Wallingford \$600.00 per year for use of its dump located on West Creek Road. Motion lost. Motion made, seconded and carried that the Selectmen be empowered to negotiate arrangements for use of dump for less money per year.
- 16. Discussion of setting up a card system for use of Listers in appraising property. Matter laid on the table.
- 17. Motion made, seconded and carried that the Selectmen be empowered to acquire land for a municipal forest.
- 18. Motion made, seconded and carried that a tax of \$3.00 be paid to cover current expenses for the General Account.
- 19. Motion made, seconded and carried that a tax of \$7.07 be paid to cover current expenses for the Town School Account.
- 20. Motion made, seconded and carried that Article 16 be taken from the table. Discussion followed. Motion made, seconded and carried that a tax of 10c be voted to start the Listers on new system of appraisal. The

10c to be added to the General Tax of \$3.00. The total Tax \$3.10.

Motion made, seconded and carried that the Selectmen be empowered to set a speed limit of 35 miles per hour on the old Rte. #103 or the Air Port Road.

Willard Squier suggested that the Town Officers get together and make a Budget for use of Town Money. When Money is used no further work done.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

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At the first meeting of the Selectmen of the Town of Clarendon, held on March 5, 1964, Charles Ruane was appointed Chairman of the Board.

The following officers were appointed:

Fence Viewers-Richard Pratt, Russell Powers and Henry Potter.

Pound Keeper—Hiram Spafford and Isadore LaVictoire.

Weigher of Coal-John Pratt

Inspector of wood, shingles, etc.—Howard Pierce

- Tree Warden—no one appointed—Mr. Ruane to try to find someone who would accept the office.
- Health Officer, Carroll Rich, and Fire Warden, William Lind, appointed by the State, each for three years— Terms not completed.

On March 12, the resignation of Hiram Spafford as Pound Keeper was received and Bernard Burke appointed to take his place. No one was found who would act as Tree Warden. Anyone willing to take this office for the coming year please contact the Selectmen.

The matter of buying a new truck was discussed at various times during the year. The old trucks were repaired and no new truck purchased. This has worked out very well with less expense to the Town.

The following amounts of money were borrowed during the year to pay current expense of Town General and School Accounts.

This amount was paid in full on October 10, 1964.

Interest on the above amounted to \$1,229.76. This includes interest on money borrowed later as see below.

October 10	, 1964	\$30,000.00
November	15, 1964	45,000.00

The \$45,000.00 was borrowed for one month only and paid in full on December 15, 1964, borrowing from the School Account so to do—\$45,000.00, giving a none interest bearing note for the same to the School Board, note payable on demand.

On December 29, 1964 a payment of \$12,000.00 on note was made by the General Account to the School Account—leaving due to School Account \$33,000.00 on Jan. 1, 1965.

Total Indebtedness of Town General Account on January 1, 1965:

Proctor Trust Co. Town School Account \$30,000.00 33,000.00

\$63,000.00 plus some small outstanding bills and payments to Town Officers for services.

The reason for borrowing \$45,000.00:-

By State Law the Selectmen are required to pay the total 1964 School tax into a separate School Bank Account on or before November 20. Doing this made borrowing the above noted \$45,000.00 necessary.

Once paid into the School Account, this money may be borrowed back, the School Board being willing. This is the procedure followed by your Selectmen and School Board.

As usual the Selectmen and Road Commissioner met with John Durkee, District Highway Commissioner to decide what work should be done on Town Roads. Various roads were repaired, improved and retreated. No new Black-top.

Buying Rutland Railroad property for a Town Garage was considered. Mr. Ruane talked with Railroad Officials and found the price for such land to be \$500.00. The Selectmen felt this was too high and no further action was taken.

Recently it has been suggested that the Town rent a small part of the new Fire Station for use by the Road Commissioner when repairing machinery, the matter to be discussed with the Board of Directors of the Volunteer Fire Association.

At the General Election held on November 3, 1964 the following were elected: Town Representative Justices George Ridlon Leland Congdon Irene Hill Leon Moulton George Ridlon Joseph Raiche

David Miller was appointed by the Selectmen, and recommended to the State Board of Health, to fill the office of Health Officer left vacant by the death of Carroll Rich, former Health Officer.

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Robert Kiley, Chairman of the Board of Civil Defense, resigned and Bernard Gregory was appointed to take his place.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Directors and Citizens of Clarendon:

This is my twelfth report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The schools of Clarendon began the new school year on Wednesday, September 9, 1964, with an opening enrollment of 158 pupils. This was a decrease of three pupils from the same time one year ago. There was one change in the faculty of your schools. Miss Almira Ludden left to teach in another school district and Mrs. June Sherrer moved from the Flats to the North to fill that position. Mrs, Mary Davis of Brandon was hired to the upper grade position at the Flats School.

In considering a future policy for the Clarendon Schools, your School Directors and I are agreed that the ultimate goal is to enlarge the North School as the central elementary building for the School District. This building was designed so that future expansion could be added. This would provide for grades one to six for the whole school district.

The second part of planning for the future concerns grades seven and eight and our high school students. We believe that the best provision for these students is for Clarendon to join a union high school district. This would enable the children in these grades to receive the kind of education that they need. The advantages of joining a union high school district consist among others of providing a high school to attend, transportation by the district, and a voice in the operation of the high school.

These matters need to be discussed and considered by all the citizens so that wise decisions can be made when necessary. School district reorganization is another subject that will be in the legislature this year.

The School District ended its fiscal year on June 30, 1964, with a small balance. This is most pleasing since this has not been the situation for some years.

For the next school year, 1965-1966, your School Directors and Superintendent are recommending a tax rate of \$7.15, an increase of eight cents over the present school year's tax. We will lose \$2,150 in State Aid next year and there will be some increases in tuition and teachers' salaries. By reducing other items, we expect that this tax will suffice. The 1965-1966 tax would then be divided as follows:

For the school year ending last June, high school tuition cost the District \$25,111.60. This amount was paid for forty-four students at Rutland High School, eleven at West Rutland, and six at Wallingford High School. We estimate tuition will cost over \$28,000 for the present school year.

The State Department of Éducation recently issued a comparison of elementary costs in districts operating elementary schools. The Clarendon School District elementary costs fall below the median in all respects. For example, in total current expense per pupil, Clarendon shows a figure of \$296 per pupil while the median for all districts is \$318.

Your School Directors and Superintendent have held monthly meetings throughout the year. I appreciate the cooperation that I have received from them at all times.

VERMONT DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WELFARE Montpelier, Vermont

This twenty-eighth in the series of annual reports submitted to the people of Clarendon presents tabulations for the calendar year 1964. In the Department of Social Welfare's program of assistance to the aged, blind or disabled 30% of the costs of hospital and physician services, as well as the excess over \$80.00 per month in Nursing Home care, are assessed against the town of settlement of the recipients of such care. Participation charges incurred by your community during the past year for each of these types of care were as follows:

Hospitalization Services	\$	56.39	
Physician Services	\$	72.00	

Under similar settlement provisions town participation in the program of Aid to Families with Dependent Children is at the rate of one-eighth the assistance grants while costs incurred for the care of Committed Children are borne equally by the local and state agencies. Charges assessed against your community for the former amounted to \$201.18 and for the latter \$0.00 for the year just closed.

During 1964 assistance was granted to 10 residents in your community under the Aid to the Aged, Blind or Disabled program. Direct money payments to these persons were financed entirely out of state-federal funds. Among the other programs financed from these same sources were Services for the Blind, Adoption Services and Medical Aid for the Aged. While no townby-town records are compiled for these categories, their benefits were available to all qualified residents.

CLARENDON FIRE ASSOCIATION, INC Progress Report

This town is very fortunate to have the interested group of men we now have as the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department. This Department has given an average of at least 125 hours of time per man to the Town of Clarendon this past year.

Eighteen men have completed a basic course of 45 hours. There were 13 three-hour night classes and one six-hour Sunday drill. Six men also completed the advanced 18-hour course which was comprised of officer training, master hose layouts, and pumper operations.

By completing this training, it has made your Department one of the highest ranking in the county as far as schooling is concerned.

This past year. Your Department has acquired by purchase. donation, and use of the following equipment:

A 1947 Chevrolet truck with a 1,000 gallon water tank, 1,000 gallon collapsable convas portable tank, a Hale portable pump and the use of a Gorman Rupp portable pump, a 20 * chemical all-purpose extinguisher, seven helmets, 100 foot of garden hose as booster line for small fires and cleanup purposes, an extension ladder and two roof ladders, 200 foot of 2 1/2'' hose, and several smaller articles such as handlights. etc.

The fire house is being constructed in back of the Grange Hall entirely with volunteer labor.

We feel that the spirit of community togetherness, thus aroused, has been an outstanding achievement over and above the main objective of additional fire protection for our town.

The Auxiliary has had several suppers and two Bingo parties besides working with the Fire Association on several moneymaking projects. They have donated over \$750 to the Fire Association to help buy necessary equipment and help with the building fund.

Please remember, all donations to this nonprofit association are Income Tax deductible and entitle you to voting rights in the Association. Please remember, also, that we have kept our promise not to ask for one cent of tax money at the regular Town Meeting.
